FOREWORD

The importance of statistics in informing planning and monitoring of government programs cannot be over emphasized. We need to know where we are, determine where we want to reach and also know whether we have reached there. The monitoring of socio-economic progress is not possible without measuring how we progress and establishing whether human, financial and other resources are being used efficiently.

However, these statistics have in many occasions been national in outlook and less district specific. The development of a district-based Statistical Abstract shall go a long way to solve this gap and provide district tailored statistics and will reflect the peculiar nature of the district by looking at specific statistics which would not be possible to provide at a higher level.

Data and statistics are required for designing, planning, implementing, monitoring and evaluating development programmes. For instance, statistics on school enrolment, completion rates and dropout rates e.t.c are vital in the monitoring of Universal Primary Education (UPE) and Universal Secondary Education (USE) programmes. Statistics are also needed for establishing grant aid to community schools, staff levels and other investments in the education programmes. The collection and use of statistics and performance indicators is critical for both the successful management and operation of the sectors, including Lower Local Governments.

For data to inform planning and service delivery it should be effectively disseminated to the various users and stakeholders. The initiative to compile this District Statistical Abstract is therefore an effort to support the Planning function of the Local Governments and other users interested in the Higher Local Government (HLG) statistics.

This District Statistical Abstract will go a long way in guiding District Policy makers, Planners, Researchers and other stakeholders to identify the indicators that are relevant for planning, monitoring and evaluation of Government programmes in their jurisdiction.

The Statistical Abstract will also act as an aggregation of statistics from all sectors and also information originating from NGOs and other organisations. This Statistical Abstract, therefore, is an annual snapshot documentation of the Kaliro District situation, providing a continuous update of the district status.

It is my sincere hope that the document will provide all interested users with adequate information and I also feel that where more information is required, appropriate departments should be contacted for details.

Lastly, I wish to thank the Uganda Bureau of Statistics (UBOS) for the continued Technical support to Kaliro District. I wish to thank all my Technical staff especially Mr. Tabalya Charles and Mr. Wankya Tom Francis who co-ordinated the compilation of the Statistics and Information contained in this Abstract.



GLOSSARY

Agriculture: This term is used to describe activities on crop, livestock, poultry and fishing.

Assets: These are belongings. They may be classified as;

- a) Current assets; consisting of cash, stock and book debts.
- b) Fixed assets; consisting of buildings, plant and machinery.
- c) Intangible assets being the value of goodwill or patents.

Crime: an offence for which one can be punished by law.

Economic Activity: Covers all market production and certain types of non – market production, including production and processing of primary for own consumption, own account construction (owner occupied dwellings) and other production of fixed assets for own use.

Employment: This includes all wage and salary earners and managers in all businesses and directors actively working in incorporated businesses. It includes all those working part- time or full – time and those who are permanent or temporary.

Employed persons: Persons who work for wage or salary in cash or kind or both and have a formal job attachment.

Employment status: status of an economically active person with respect to his/her position at his/her place of work and his/her mode of remuneration.

Enterprise: This is a single legal entity or combination of legal entities. It may also be a sole legal unit carrying out one or more activities at one or more locations. It may also be several establishments.

Establishment: This is an economic unit engaged in one or predominantly one kind of economic activity under single ownership or control and is situated at a single physical position.

HC III: These are health centres with facilities such as an operation room and a section for minor surgery, headed by a clinical officer.

HC IV: This is a health centre that could be classified as a small hospital. In addition to having an Operation room, it has beds for in-patients.

Industry: This is an economic activity under taken by a business establishment as specified in the ISIC.

Loan: This is money or securities supplied by one party (lender) to a second party (borrower) in a

transaction in return for a promised future payment by the borrower. Such transactions normally include payment of interest due to the lender as per agreed repayment schedules between the two parties.

Net Enrolment Rate: The ratio of pupils in primary school aged 6-12 years to the District total Population aged 6-12 years.

Net Intake Rate: The ratio of pupils aged 6 in primary one to the District total population aged 6 years.

Occupation: Refers to the nature of task and duties performed during the reference period preceding The interview by persons in paid employment, unpaid family work or self-employment jobs.

Wage bill: All cash payments made by employers in return for labour provided by employee. The payments include salaries and wages, overtime, holiday pay, bonuses, commissions and other allowances paid to the employees

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The District Statistical Abstract will be an annual publication of Kaliro District Local Government. It gives a statistical summary of socio –economic and demographical data of the district. It has 9 chapters with each chapter covering a department, preceded by general information about Kaliro District. It ends with a set of sequentially arranged annex tables for the readers' discretion.

Chapter one presents background information, covering location and size, the historical background of the district, tourism, geographical features, topography, climate, soils, hydrology and vegetation.

Kaliro district was established by an act of parliament in 2005. It is located in the eastern part of Uganda and has a population of 285,963 people, of which 143,531 are males and 142,432 are females. Compared to the population of 2014, the population of Kaliro district has increased by 3.5%. The district has two counties, 11 sub counties and four town councils. It has a total of 87 parishes and 601 villages.

Chapter two presents statistics from management and support services, covering personnel in the district, information and public relations, internal audit, functionality of boards and commissions which include; council, PAC, DLB and DSC.

Chapter three covers information on finance and planning which include; population characteristics, social economic characteristics and planning and budgeting process.

Poverty and population

According to the UN definition, a person is regarded to be below the poverty line if he /she cannot consume afford to spend 1 US Dollar per day. Considering the above definition, 42% of the population is below the poverty line compared to 31% national figure. Comparing sub counties, Nawaikoke has the highest proportion of population below the poverty line at 45% and Namugongo has the lowest at 33%.

According to figure 3.1 the only 35% of the population in Kaliro is within the productive age bracket implying that 65% of the population is dependant.

Chapter four covers the health sectors and it includes information on health infrastructure, staffing levels, health services utilisation, HIV/AIDS, accessibility to health services and sanitation

Health Services

The district has 20 health units, 1 health centre IV, 9 health centre IIIs and 10 health centre IIs, 12 government aided and 8 NGO health unit.

It has only two medical doctors at the health centre IV hence a doctor: patient ratio of 1: 55,323. Nurse: patient ratio is 1:7,739 and midwife: pregnant woman ratio is 1:8,668. One health facility serves 11,847 people,

Chapter five covers the education sector and it includes information on existing institutions, education infrastructure, staffing levels , efficiency, enrolment , performance in national exams, Special needs education, sports and inspection.

Enrolment

The district as a total primary enrolment of 77995 pupils of which 41281 are males and 36714 are females which give an enrolment ratio of 0.502:0.498, In secondary schools the total enrolment is 10913 of which 6,850 are males and 5,744 are females which gives an enrolment ratio of 0.56:0.47. The District has 200 primary schools, 111 are private and 89 are government aided. This implies that almost half of the girls drop out of school after primary seven because at primary the ratio is almost 1:1 and in secondary it decreases to 0.56:0.47.

Efficiency ratios

The pupil classroom ratio stands at 132:1 and the pupil teacher ratio is 53:1, dropout rate is 4%, pupil desk ratio is 13:1 and the pupil latrine stance ratio is 15:1.

Education attainment by grade

In Kaliro district 26% of the population has never gone to school, 5% never completed primary education, 55% completed primary, and 8% completed secondary while only 2.4% completed tertiary education. The implication is that over 80% of the pupils who completed primary drop out of school and only 2.4% can compete for jobs in the labour market.

Literacy rate

Literacy rate refers to the proportion of population 10 years and above which can either read or write in any language. In Kaliro district only 56% of the population above 10 years can either read or write.

Chapter six covers the works and technical services department and it includes information on the district road network, water transport, housing, water sources, physical planning and vehicles owned.

Roads

The total length of the road network is 1,033km of which 121 km is the length of trunk roads, 391.5km district feeder roads, 519km community roads, 1.5km tarmac roads.

Vehicles

The district has only 7 functional vehicles of which 2 for health, 2 for works and technical services, 2 for production and 1 for council. The rest of the departments have motor cycles.

Water

The district has a total of 591 bore holes functional and 102 non functional and 45 shallow wells which puts the district safe water coverage at 62.9%

Chapter seven covers the Natural Resources department and it includes information on environment and sanitation, water bodies, land management and ownership, and forestry in general

The district has 3 forests of which 2 are natural and 1 is planted forest reserve with a total of 158 ha of natural forest and 5 ha of planted forest excluding those owned by individuals for commercial purposes.

Chapter eight covers the community based services department and it includes information on gender, youths, disabled, elderly, labour, probation, child protection and development partners.

Chapter nine covers the Production sector and it includes information on Crops, livestock, fisheries, trade and commerce,

Crop husbandry

In Kaliro district 75.8% of the households depend on agriculture. The 10 Top most crops grown in order of preference include; maize, sweet potatoes, millet, cassava, ground nuts, bananas, beans, cotton and rice .

Livestock

Livestock include animals and birds. In Kaliro district 75.8% of the households are involved in livestock keeping. The proportion for crop is the same as that for livestock because most houses hold practice mixed farming. The major animals kept in ascending order include; goats, indigenous cattle, pigs, sheep, exotic cattle, rabbits and donkeys. Below are some high lights on the number of animals in the district by category.

Only 0.46 % of the farmers are practicing fish farming with a total of 76 ponds and 26% of them are found in Bumanya, 25% in Nawaikoke, 20% in Gadumire, 17% in Namugongo, 10% in Namwiwa,

Extension services

The district has 44 extension workers 15 veterinary officers, 1 Vermin Control Officer, 14 agriculture officers, 1 entomological officer and 12 fisheries officers. This makes the ratio of extension workers to farmers 1600:1 implying that 1 extension worker serves 1600 farmers.

Trade and commerce

The district has 87 registered PDM SACCOSs distributed in all the 15 lower local governments, EMYOGA 36,Communitycooperatives,101

Introduction

In September 2000, the 189 member states of the United Nations adopted the UN Millennium Declaration (MD), which includes the eight Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). The Millennium Declaration and MDGs are unique, for the first time in history, all 189 governments – rich and poor reached consensus on commonly agreeable targets to be achieved by 2015.

In an attempt to meet the requirement of monitoring progress towards the Goals, in early 2003, the UN System in Uganda prepared the first report on Uganda's progress towards achieving the Goals. The report indicated that while Uganda appears to be on track to achieving some of the Goals, it faced a number of constraints to achieving others. The report also noted that the country has steadily increased its data gathering capacity.

In order to enhance or promote public debate and at the same time influence the whole range of decisions both at national and district level, it is critical that adequate awareness is created on the MDGs so as to lead to re-orientation of policies to promote the achievement of the goals

CHAPTER 1: BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Introduction

This chapter gives background information, location, size, climate, and vegetation, geographical and other features about the district.

1.1 Location and size

Kaliro District borders Kamuli District in the west, Iganga in the south, in the north-east it adjoins Pallisa District and in the north, Kaliro is bordered by the Lake Nakuwa and Pallisa.

Administratively the district has two Counties 11 sub-counties, four self-accounting Town Councils, Kaliro. The district comprises of 87 parishes and 601 villages. The administration headquarter is located in Kaliro Town, 32 kilometres North of Iganga Town.

1.2. Historical Background

At the time the national population and housing census was conducted in 2002, Kaliro district was not in existence yet. It was still a county (called Bulamogi then) in Kamuli district. However, in July 2005, Kaliro having been carved from Kamuli became operational as a district of independent status. In light of this, all issues that hitherto had been regarded as those for Bulamogi County will now be addressed to represent issues of Kaliro district in this analytical report.

Due to the continuous movements and intermixing of people within the Busoga region, the history of Busoga is complex. However, it can be asserted that the earliest inhabitants of Busoga belonged to the same Bantu group comprising the Banyoro and the Baganda. Like the other Bantu groups their origins can therefore be traced back to the Katanga region of central Africa. The earliest settlers in Busoga are said to have occupied the lake shore areas of modern Bukooli. These early settlements took place far back in the 14th century. Other people from the Mount Elgon region who are said to have settled in Bugabula and Bulamogi, (Kaliro district) later joined them.

The Basoga were organized under principalities or smaller chiefdoms with one paramount chief over the whole Busoga, which was under the sovereignty of Bunyoro and later of Buganda. By the time of the 19th century, there were 15 virtually independent principalities. During the same century Buganda influence greatly increased over the southern Busoga principalities. The northern principalities still had a connection with Bunyoro and indeed their language contained many Banyoro words. In 1906 the British protectorate accomplished an administrative amalgamation of the multifarious kingdoms of pre-colonial Busoga into a single integrated structure. Representatives from the small pre-colonial kingdoms constituted the Busoga Lukiiko.

In the same year, Semei Kakungulu was appointed president of the Lukiiko. His reign ended with his resignation in 1913. This led to the collapse of the monstrous political structure and the abolition of the office of the "President of the Lukiiko of Busoga". Later, there arose demands within Busoga for the revival of the office. In 1919, the Isebantu Kyabazinga's office was established as an alternative to it and Ezekieri Waako was appointed the first Isebantu, Kyabazinga of Busoga.

After the dissolution of the kingdoms by Amin in 1972, the monarchs were reinstated in 1993. Since then, the kingdoms of Ankole, Buganda, Bunyoro, Busoga and Toro exist formally but they have just a cultural function. In contrast to former times, they don't have political, religious, judicial or administrative competence. In economic aspects, Kaliro as well as the rest of Busoga experienced the biggest changes during the early 20th century through the introduction of cotton and coffee. Quick spread of cotton all over Busoga and its trade led to a fresh economic impetus

1.3 Tourism

Lake Nakuwa is an important conservation area that was declared a Ramsar site (2006) Most productive in E.A and its fishing activities (with numerous fish types e.g. Niloticus, Protopterus, Clarius and lates) which drains in Lumbuye swamp which also stretches from Iganga to Kamuli. It supports endangered and rare endemic fish and bird species i.e. Haplochromines fish and for birds Papyrus yellow warbler and the Shoebill.

Swamps/wetlands of Lumbuye and Naigombwa which stretch to Kamuli and Namutumba districts respectively.

Landing Sites like; Nawampiti, Busulumba, Panyolo, Isaalo located in Nawaikoke and Gadumire sub counties.

Wild animals like; Crocodiles, Hippos, especially along Nawampiti landing site.

1.4. Geographical Features

Although Kaliro is located at the inner part of Uganda, it has characteristics like a border district. Besides the single dry-weather road between Kaliro and the main road from Iganga to Mbale, the motorable connections to neighbouring districts are directed towards Kamuli, Buwenge and Iganga towns. Therefore the most important road is the tarmac road between Kaliro and Iganga

1.4.1 Topography

Geologically Kaliro like most of Uganda exists of "wholly changed rocks", a kind of "Precambrian rocks". Only on the lakesides of Lake Kyoga one finds quaternary sedimentary rocks

1.4.2 Climate

Rainfall, Temperature, Humidity and Winds

The rainfall is a climatic factor of the greatest economic significance for the district. The district experiences a bimodal type of rainfall with peaks in March-June as well as August –November, with the March to June peak as the major one. The average annual temperatures in most areas of the district range from 19^o C -25^o C Celsius.

1.4.3 Soils

The soils are predominantly dark brown clays (grumosolic soils), underlain by gneiss. It has generally shallow sandy loams of medium to low fertility.

The predominant vegetation cover in the district is the forest/Savannah mosaic constituted of a mixture of forest remnants and savannah trees with grass and shrubs. Much of it is secondary vegetation that has succeeded the original forest cover as a result of farming, timber and fuel harvesting and other forms of land use do take place.

Kaliro district experiences land degradation and it mainly results from population pressure and poor land use practices. As farm holdings become smaller and smaller, the plots are over cultivated. Given that the soils are less fertile in some places, over cultivation leads to degradation, which is currently evident in many parts of the district.

CHAPTER 2: MANAGEMENT SUPPORT SERVICES

Introduction

This chapter presents statistics on management and support services. It presents details on district administrative structure. Human Resources Management, the Councils, Boards and Commissions, Public Accounts Committee and land board.

2.1 Administrative Structure

The District has two counties, eleven rural Sub-counties and one Town Council. The District constitutes of 52 parishes and 456 village councils, distributed as in Table A.2.1 in the Annex. The District has two Town Boards namely: Bulumba and Namwiwa.

The District Council is the highest political authority, with 16 members under the headship of the District Chairperson. It has a technical team headed by the Chief Administrative Officer, distributed in nine departments. Each of the department has a head and under each department, there are a number of sections. See Table A.2.2 in the Annex for details.

2.3 Council, Committees, Boards, and Commissions

The mandate of local governments is to provide services as stipulated in the Local Governments Act, 1997 [Sect.31 (1) (b)]. The statutory bodies, commissions and committees play a very crucial role in the fulfilment of this mandate. These organs help council to:

- Provide quality service;
- Improve the service delivery system; and
- Be more accountable and transparent.

These organs provide checks and balances to avoid abuse of power, which might otherwise arise due to concentration of powers in the organs of one organ; the Council. The statutory bodies, commissions and committees that are provided for under the LGA, 1997 [Section 18 (d)] are:

- The District Service Commission (DSC);
- The Local Government Public Accounts Commission (LGPAC);
- The District Tender Board (DTB); and
- The District Land Board.

Section 10 of the Local Government Act, 1997 stated that the council is the highest political authority within the area of jurisdiction of a local government, and it has legislative and executive powers to be exercised in accordance with the Constitution and the local government Act, 1997. Part III of the Local Government Act,

1997 details out the local government set up, composition and election procedures of the Councils and functions of the respective offices and committees.

A District Council consists of:

- A district chairperson or mayor in the case of a city is the political head of the district and elected by universal adult suffrage through a secret ballot.
- One councillor directly elected to represent an electoral area of a district.
- Two councillors, one of whom shall be a female youth representing the youths in the district.
- Two councillors with disabilities, one of whom shall be female, representing persons with disabilities, and
- Women councillors forming one third of the Council.

2.5 District Service Commission

Article 198 (1) of the Constitution and Section 55 (1) of the Local Government Act, 1997 stipulate that each district is mandated to have one District Service Commission. It offers services to all the local governments under its jurisdiction.

Article 198 (2) of the Constitution and Section 55 (2) of the Local Government Act states that the DSC shall consists of a chairperson and such other members as a district council shall determine, at least one of whom shall represent urban authorities and all of whom shall be appointed by the District Executive Committee with the approval of the Public Service Commission. The district service commission is responsible for;

- Appointing persons for any office in the District against approved posts
- Confirming public officers in their appointments within the jurisdiction of the District;
- Promoting civil servants to higher ranks;
- Exercising disciplinary control over public officers;
- Terminating public appointments through dismissals, retirement in public interest, etc.
- Protecting public officers against arbitrariness, nepotism and other mal-practices; and
- Clearing and selecting officers for relevant training (both locally and overseas) lasting for at least 3 months

Kaliro District got its service commission in 2007 and it has been executing the above functions. The table below summarises the key performance indicators on composition and functionality of the district service commission.

- Ensure that quarterly audit reports from Chief Internal Auditors are produced, a copy of which is submitted to the LGPAC Section 91 (2)
- Make recommendations on how the Council can improve its financial performance;
- Submits its reports to Council and to the Minister responsible for Local Government who lays the report before Parliament.

CHAPTER 3 DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIO-ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS

Introduction

This chapter presents information from the department of finance and planning. It focuses on the population and social-economic characteristics of the district, the planning & budgeting process, the available revenue sources, and the expenditures in the previous financial year.

The Finance department is composed of 6 sectors which include; Audit, the Procurement Unit and Planning Unit. It is one of the biggest departments in the District whose objectives are to;

- Identify and expand the revenue base;
- build Finance and Management Capacity at district level; and
- Strengthen Data Management systems, Revenue VRS and to influence demographic trends & patterns in a desirable direction.

3.1 Population Characteristics

To formulate present and future development programmes, the district needs to know the size, quality, distribution and growth of its population. Population censuses are the main sources of demographic data in general and information on population size, distribution and growth rate in particular. Other sources may include various surveys, Birth and Death Registration and Administrative Records.

3.1.2 Population Distribution

CHAPTER 4: HEALTH SERVICES

Introduction

The Department of Health is headed by the District Health Officer whose mandate is guided by the District 5 Year Strategic Plan that focuses on the achievement of equity through increased access to Minimum Health Care Package (MHCP), Quality care, efficiency accountability and transparency.

The overall goal of the sector is to provide good quality services to the people of this district so as to make them attain good standards of health in order to live a healthy and reproductive life. The sector objective is to reduce morbidity and mortality from the major causes of ill health and premature health and disparities therein". This district has 40 Health Units of different categories. Some of them are Government hospitals while others are owned by Non –Government Organizations. The distribution is fair, but some of them lack the basic equipment to offer reasonable services. Many rural units require rehabilitation and equipping. Besides diseases, poor nutrition has contributed to worrying situation. Because of cross cutting nature of health issues, there is need for an integrated approach to health.

There are various NGOs both Local and International that are involved in AIDS prevention and control in the district. Such activities include blood screening and counselling, medical treatment, home care, pastoral education, health education, AIDS research and orphan support.

The district has 20 health units, 1 health centre IV, 6 health centre IIIs and 13 health centre IIs, 12 government aided and 8 NGO health unit.

It has only two medical doctors at the health centre IV hence a doctor: patient ratio of 1: 55,323. Nurse: patient ratio is 1:7,739 and midwife: pregnant woman ratio is 1:8,668. One health facility serves 11,847 people hence there is need for more recruitment of staff in the Health department of Kaliro district.

Conclusion

The district has a total primary enrolment of 77,995 pupils of which 41,281 are males and 36,714 are females which give an enrolment ratio of 0.9:1. In secondary schools the total enrolment is 13,630 of which 8,418 are males and 5,212 are females which gives an enrolment ratio of 0.6:1.

The pupil classroom ratio stands at 131:1 and the pupil teacher ratio is 52:1, dropout rate is 4%, pupil desk ratio is 9:1 and the pupil latrine stance ratio is 15:1.

That means that there is need for more infrastructure in schools, recruit more staff and purchase enough desks for the pupils to improve pupil performance in schools.

CHAPTER 6: WORKS AND TECHNICAL SERVICES

Introduction

The Works Sector comprises of two Departments (Roads and Technical Services and that of Rural Water and Sanitation). The sector further has to ensure proper quality in design, construction, inspection and maintenance of all Local Administration building structures. The national roads are developed and maintained by the Ministry of Works and Transport. The District Local Government maintains district roads while Community access roads are the responsibility of the Lower Local Governments. This section presents selected statistics on work services delivery.

6.1 Roads

The District has a total of approximately **121** Km of trunk roads, **393** km of feeder roads and **519** km of community Access Roads. The district is in charge of maintaining the condition of Feeder roads whereas Sub-Counties maintain community roads.

6.1.1 Roads by grade, Length and condition

There are several categories of road networks including Trunk roads managed by the Central Government, Feeder roads managed by the District and Town councils, and community Access Roads are maintained by community members.

CHAPTER 7: NATURAL RESOURCES

Introduction

The Department of Natural Resources comprises of the Natural Resources Office, the Lands and Physical Planning Office as well as the Forestry, Environment & Wetlands Office. It is charged with the responsibility of ensuring sustainable and productive utilisation of natural resources for poverty reduction, enhanced economic growth and improved livelihoods. The major causes of the deterioration of the quality and the quantity of the natural resource base is associated with human activity. There is massive deforestation particularly on privately owned land where most of the districts tree resources are. However the deforestation has been exaggerated by the expanding commercial sugarcane plantations and the increased demand for forest products most especially charcoal which has ready market in Kenya and also paying premium. This is closely followed by wetland degradation as a result of cultivation of crops. Other threats are soil erosion whose magnitude and impact has never been quantified.

Introduction

The production sector is comprised of five sectors namely: Agriculture, Veterinary Services, Fisheries, Entomology as well as Trade and Industry. The department also ensures that appropriate institutional linkages are maintained with all relevant sector agencies; comprising mostly crop, livestock, fisheries, forestry and industrial research, marketing organisations, NGOs and CBOs engaged in agricultural activities

9.1 Agriculture

The term agriculture is used in a very broad sense to cover all the agricultural activities namely; crops, livestock, poultry, and fish farming.

Agriculture is the most common economic activity in the district. The majority of farmers are small holders who grow both perennial and annual crops. The perennial crops include Banana, Coffee, and Tea, while the annuals include maize, sweet potatoes, beans, cassava and groundnuts. Table 9.1 in the annex shows the major crops grown in the District as of 2020.
